"...will the seeds that we plant today have any impact on women in science and Girls In Science

In an effort to encourage the interests of young girls and women in the fields of STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics), for the first time, WPF is involved in a sponsorship of a science fair along with the Gateway Nano Science Center, the Girl Scouts, and the Greensboro Science Center (formerly the Natural Science Center). We have our Foundation and lots of innovative leadership to thank for this.

It is disappointing to discover that there have been only 16 female recipients of the Nobel Prize in physics, chemistry or physiology/ medicine since the Nobel Prize began in 1901. There have been over 560 recipients in these fields from 1901 through 2012. In my frantic "digging" to find something interesting to write about this month, I read about two exceptional women scientists who deserved to have won a Nobel Prize, but didn't. I had never heard of either. One was Lise Meitner, born to a large Jewish family in Vienna Austria in 1878. She worked on radioactivity and nuclear physics and was part of the team that discovered nuclear fission. She is often mentioned as "one of the most glaring examples of women's scientific achievement overlooked by the Nobel committee" (Wikipedia). She became the second woman to receive a doctoral degree from the University of Vienna in 1905. Her career is an exceptional one worth reading about. She worked with some of the most brilliant scientists of that time and, in 1926, she became the first woman in Germany to assume a post of full professorship in physics at the University of Berlin. Einstein referred to her as the German "Marie Curie". She co-discovered nuclear fission in 1939, and refused the offer to work on the Manhattan Project saying "I will have nothing to do with a bomb!". Because she had to

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flee Germany due to the war, and because of her separation from her collaborator, Otto Hahn, the Nobel committee was not aware of her work. Many researchers believed that Otto was guilty of not giving her the credit she deserved.

From 1933 onward, Hitler purged Germany of Jewish scientists. Lise finally realized how dangerous it was in 1938 and escaped to the Netherlands with virtually no possessions. After the war, she became a Swedish citizen. She decided to retire in 1960 and moved to the United Kingdom to be close to family. She won numerous awards and had an element named in her honor, Meitnerium. Lise was 89 when she died of heart failure.

Rosalind Franklin, a British biophysicist, was another female scientist deserving of the Nobel committee. She was only 37 in 1958 when she died of ovarian cancer. She made critical contributions to the understanding of the molecular structures of DNA and RNA. The discovery of its structure helped scientists understand how genetic information is passed from parents to children. Her expert X-ray diffraction work

at King's College revealed DNA's double helix structure. Her understanding and interpretation of the data were also critical. Francis Crick and James Watson were working on this project at the same time as Rosalind. They were two of the scientists who won the Nobel Prize for their work related to DNA in 1962 along with Maurice Wilkins of Kings College. This was four years after Rosalind's death, and the Nobel Prize is not given posthumously. Here is the controversial part: In 1952, Francis Crick, who worked at Cambridge with Watson, was given a copy of a report containing many of Rosalind's calculations (from King's College where she worked at the time). Crick and Watson also received copies of Rosalind's diffraction photographs showing the double helix of the DNA. Although her work belonged to King's College, this was given to them without her knowledge or consent, and it was not obtained through appropriate channels. All of Rosalind's research, interpretations, and X–ray images were used to solve the final obstacles that Crick and Watson encountered and helped them to win the Nobel Prize. Some researchers have said that Crick and Watson's acknowledgements of

Rosalind's contributions were very muted and always coupled with Maurice Wilkins' name who also did research at Kings College.

One has to wonder had she lived, would she have gotten the credit that she had deserved. Rosalind's exposure to X-ray radiation is considered by some to be a factor in her illness and death. Fate was cruel and Luck was bad to her. Posthumously, she won many awards, but she went to her grave not fully realizing her contributions to science.

Looking twenty, thirty, forty years into the future, will the seeds that we plant today have any impact on women in science and Girls In Science and Technology? Many of us won't be around to see it, but it is up to us to plant the seeds and that is what we are doing. WPF
